Tough Conversations

Tough conversations.

I think I would be pretty accurate to say that none of us likes to have them! But what makes them hard? Usually, it is when two people have differing perceptions of a situation, or unresolved hard feelings from the past. But sometimes it is a matter of needing to share something that the other person will find hard to hear.

We are in the midst of parent-teacher conferences right now and most of the conversations are pretty positive! It's great to hear about the growth of your child in school: academically, socially and spiritually. In some cases, the conversations are ongoing about how you are already working together with the teacher to help your child overcome an obstacle or work on social skills that both of you are aware of. Once in a while, some behavior or academic concerns that are seen at school require the teacher to share with you that your child was not treating another child respectfully, or that testing may be needed to see if we can provide more support in some sort of resource program. This can be hard to hear, especially if there haven't been issues in the past. When it comes to conversations between adults about their own relationship, or an event that happened, it can be even harder. In my role as an administrator, I have time and again witnessed two parties that both have very legitimate perceptions coming at a situation from different angles and struggling to approach the conversation, whether it's students or adults. With adults, I've honestly noticed that emails often create a tension that wasn't anticipated.

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This happens to me as well. I think I'm just responding in a factual way and the other person feels like I'm being blunt. Or, I respond in a thoughtful way and the other person feels like I am not getting to the point and skirting the issue. Then, when I try to reply with a further resolution, the irritation increases because we can't get past the initial perception.

So, when it comes down to it, I've always found it best to talk face-to-face. Clarifying what was said, and what was meant, is so much easier when you can read body language and facial expressions. Personally, I also find it harder to stay angry, or annoyed, if I am really trying to listen to what the other person is thinking or feeling. I always come away with at least a better understanding of their perception, even if I can't fully agree with it. It's only when I enter the conversation convinced that my perception is the only one, or refuse to be open to the other's perspective, that I come away more frustrated.

But the conversations are still hard! There is something that feels emotionally "dangerous" about being vulnerable face-to-face. But I'm convinced that it is the best way to work out issues. In that same vein, please always feel free to reach out to Mr. Naumann or to me if you have any concerns or questions regarding the school. Our goal is to be here and available for you. BIST Tip:

Safe Seat

By now most of you are aware of the concept of a safe seat in each classroom (whether or not the teacher chooses to call it that. Remember that it is intended for exactly that purpose, to help the child be SAFE. It is all too easy to see the safe seat as a time out chair. It is not. So strike time out! A time out is moving to a designated location for a specific time, but usually with a disappointed voice tone on the part of the adult to show the child they are "in trouble" and when time is up they go right back to the previous activity. The purpose of the safe seat, however, is to allow for a reset of emotions. Behaviors don't happen in isolation but as a response to something. Whether in or out of the classroom, whatever is causing a child to act in ways that are not helping to be a successful learner, the child needs an opportunity to restart. By going to the safe seat, the child can move away from distractions and even expectations for participation, etc. Also, the child is GUARANTEED (unless they asked to go to the safe seat themselves) that the teacher will always check in with them later to process and see

if they are ready to return to the regular learning environment. This processing is invaluable to help the child grow in the skills necessary to be successful in the classroom. Once we start seeing children ASK to go to the safe seat themselves, we know they are understanding its purpose and using this resource as it is meant to be – a tool for success!
