BIST Tip: Ask, Don't Tell

When a student has made a poor choice or hasn't followed directions, we adults are good at telling them what they should have done! Sometimes this leads to nagging. "I told you to walk silently. You need to keep your hands to yourself. How many times have I said..., etc." A helpful alternative is to engage the student with a question, which helps them to verbalize and take ownership for their actions. The two most common questions to ask are, "Are you okay?" and "What do you think I'm concerned about?" By answering questions, the student is more likely to acknowledge and think about the behavior. This can look like, "Are you okay?" "Yes." "Oh, I wondered if you understood what I asked you to do." "I did." "Good. Are you going to do it?" "Yes." For older students, the second question tends to work well, "What do you think I'm concerned about?" "I don't know." "Did I give you an instruction?" "Yes." "Did you follow it?" "No." "Can you do what I asked you to do the first time?" "Yes." By engaging in questioning, you avoid a power struggle and the student is more likely to follow through. It's a win-win!
